Candidates are able to design a program of study based on individual scholarly and professional goals, concentrating on one country (China, Japan, or Korea) or developing region-wide expertise.




TOTAL ELECTIVE COURSES REQUIRED FOR THE TRADITIONAL GRADUATE DEGREE

In addition to course requirements, EAAS MA students must have the equivalent of 3 years of Chinese/Japanese/Korean language proficiency by the end of the program, either through coursework or placement test.

*The Cultural History course requirement can be fulfilled by a number of courses in the Art History, Anthropology East Asian Languages and Cultures, History and Religion departments. Students should consult with the graduate advisor when selecting a course.
